

NDFP and GRP agree to reopen peace talks

he Negotiating Panel of the National Democratic Front of the Philippines (NDFP) and senior cabinet and military officials of the Government of the Republic of the Philippines (GRP) separately announced on November 28 plans to reopen peace talks. They publicized the joint statement signed by the NDFP Negotiating Panel and the GRP last November 23 in Oslo, Norway.

Comrade Julie de Lima, head of the NDF Negotiating Panel, addressed the public and read statements together with other members Comrade Coni Ledesma, and Nonoy Palima, and Ka Luis Jalandoni, senior adviser.

The Oslo Joint Statement is a declaration of intent or desire to reopen the talks and on how it will be carried out. It is a general declaration that combined the aspirations of both sides: the resolution of "deep-rooted socio-economic and political issues" and "resolving the roots of the armed conflict," on the part of the NDFP; and on the other side, the "end of the armed struggle" and "transformation of the CPP-NPA-NDFP," which the GRP aims for.



significant in itself and opens doors to many potentials and futures in the pursuit of a just and lasting peace in our homeland and for the welfare of our people," said Ka Luis Jalandoni, member of the NDFP National Executive Council, on the day the joint statement was signed. He said, both parties are ready to continue negotiations while "adhering to the successes and learning from the lessons of the past."

The joint statement is the product of a series of informal discussions held in the Netherlands and Norway. These started as early as 2022 between emissaries of the GRP and the NDFP with the help of the Royal Norwegian Government (RNG). It was signed for the GRP side by Special Assistant to the President Antonio Ernesto F. Lagdameo Jr., the emissary Gen.

Emmanuel Bautista (Ret) and Presidential Adviser Peace, Reconciliation and Unity Secretary Carlito Galvez Jr. On the NDFP side. Julie, Luis, Ka Coni, and Ka Nonoy signed. The signing was witnessed by RNG Special Envoy Christina Revheim.

The NDFP thanked the RNG for its steadfast support and persistent efforts to bring the two parties together for renewed talks. Norway's foreign minister Espen Barth Eide and other officials attended the signing ceremony in Oslo.

Full of thorns and spikes

While the CPP welcomed the negotiating panel's signing of the joint statement, it said the path to opening the talks, and especially towards a just and lasting peace, is filled with thorns and spikes.

This is only the first half step to reopening negotiations. It may lead to the actual reopening of peace talks, and also possibly not.

"There are peace talks because there is a war," explained Marco Valbuena, chief information officer of the CPP. "THe NDFP and GRP represent two co-belligerent sides of the civil war in the Philippines. They are adversaries and represent diametrically opposed interests and goals, but meet in negotiations under the declared objective of achieving a just and lasting peace."

According to Ka Julie, the talks are confronted with practical matters such as the terrorist designation of the GRP to CPP, NPA, NDFP and also Ka Luis. Also, the NDFP will find it difficult to negotiate if its consultants who have been illegally arrested and imprisoned by the GRP for the past six years remain in jail.

NPA-Iloilo twice attacks 82nd IB

TWO ARMED OFFENSIVES were carried out by units of the New People's Army (NPA)-Central Panay (Jose Percival Estocada Jr Command) against 82nd IB troopers on November 12 and November 21.

On November 12, the NPA-Central Panay attacked a unit of the 82nd IB at the border of Barangay Atimonan and Barasalon in Janiuay. The NPA hit the 82nd IB unit operating in Sityo Matagsim, Barangay Aglobong, Janiuay, Iloilo on November 21, around 2 pm.

Civilians bore the brunt of the 82nd IB's retaliation when it indiscriminately fired at three houses in the area on November 21. One resident was injured in the shooting.

Kabataang Makabayan strengthens in universities

he strengthening of various Kabataang Makabayan (KM) chapters in several key private and public universities in Metro Manila were successively announced recently. On November 30, they launched various activities to celebrate the 59th anniversary of their organization.

KM in the universities

The KM-Armando Mendoza announced on November 20 the re-establishment of their chapter on October 10. They held a discussion on the orientation and constitution of the KM, paid honor and tribute to the martyrs, planned activities and elected a new executive committee. The chapter was named after Armando Mendoza, a University of Santo Tomas student in the 1970s.

"At a time when the reactionaries are shameless in their crimes against and oppression of the Filipino people, KM's response is still the people's democratic revolution," said the chapter.

At the Polytechnic University of the Philippines (PUP) in Sta. Mesa, Manila, KM-Balangay Kira Mindoro members held a lightning rally on November 29. Before the rally, chapter members carried out OP-OD (oplan pinta-oplan dikit or operation graffiti and postering) inside the campus and painted the calls "Advance the people's war!" "KM@59" and others.

Chapters of KM in the University of the Philippines (UP)-Diliman and UP-Los Baños also conducted OP-OD in their campuses. The KM-Eduardo Aquino chapter posted announcements around the campus of UP-Manila about its establishment last November. KM revitalization in another private university and a state university in Metro Manila for the last half of the year was also reported.

Issues of the youth

KM's role within the universities and colleges is key to encourage the youth to take the path of the people's democratic revolution and advance mass struggles. In Ang Bayan's interview with Rose, a KM member at a university in Cavite, she said oppressive conditions in their school persist. She said that these are some of the issues that arouse the patriotic spirit of the youth.

"The government's funding for the basic needs of students is unfair," Rose said. They complain of severe shortages of classrooms and facilities affecting class schedules and the quality of teaching.

University fees are burdensome for someone like her despite free tuition. Her family's meager monthly income of ₱15,000 is not enough to support her education and family expenses. Rose added, the state of education in the country is far from the proper service she expects.

KM to the people's army

These problems and issues encouraged Ka Andrea to leave the university and join the New People's Army (NPA).

She said she witnessed the inaction to such issues under the current rotten system and government and the limitations of struggling within the prevailing system. "They (reactionary government officials) are indifferent to the legitimate calls of the people." She knows armed resistance will achieve a society that will truly respond to the needs of the youth.

Before she took up arms, Ka Andrea participated in organizing KM among young farmers. "Even when there was a threat of military encampment and state surveillance in our organizing, we successfully built the KM chapter in the area, we moved with caution and secrecy."

In the NPA, she has assisted well in the unit's formation of a municipality-level chapter of KM in its area of responsibility. They had 50 youth from 12 barangays attend

the gathering. "The youth who attended were full of hope and enthusiasm. That was my first experience in building a large KM chapter at a higher level," she said.



Revolutionaries in EV and ST hold 21-gun salute for Party martyrs

UNITS OF THE New People's Army (NPA) in Eastern Visayas and Southern Tagalog performed a 21-gun salute for martyrs of the Communist Party of the Philippines (CPP) and the revolutionary movement in their respective regions.

On November 30, the NPA-Southern Tagalog conducted a 21-gun salute for Josephine Mendoza (Ka Sandy), one of the region's Party leader. At the same time, Party units here also launched secret gatherings and honors for her.

On November 23, the NPA-Eastern Visayas gave a silent 21-gun salute for the Imelda 6, the six comrades who were martyred in the bombing of the 8th ID in Barangay Imelda, Las Navas, Northern Samar on November 23, 2022. They saluted Ka Helenita Pardalis (Ka Elay), Ka Gil Giray (Ka Biboy), Ka Mamoy, Ka Mela, Ka Mike and Ka Joshua.

The National Democratic Front-EV also honored the martyrs of Dolores 22, Catbalogan 10 and Bobon 7, all victims of the terrorist bombing of the 8th ID, and all the martyrs of the Philippine revolution.

Youth in people's militia

IN A VILLAGE in Southern Tagalog, two Kabataang Makabayan (KM) members now serving the people's militia make great contributions. They assist in ensuring the security of the residents and the New People's Army (NPA) unit when it encamps temporarily near their community.

Ka Maki, 23, and Ka Aja, 21, are enthusiastic, resourceful and brave in performing the work of the people's militia. The two are farm workers who work on a daily basis in the coconut and rice fields. They occasionally go out to town to work in construction or as guards in piggeries, poultry or duck farms.

In one series of operations by soldiers, they served the NPA as eyes and reporters. They regularly patrol mountains to gather information. They also deliver food support from mass organization and Party branches to the NPA.

One time, Ka Maki boldly went to a farmer's house which the military passed by earlier. He calmed the terrified farmers down and gathered details from them about the soldiers and as to which direction they were heading. He immediately reported these to the NPA unit.

Ka Aja, meanwhile, regularly does reconnaisance. He assists in erasing traces of Red warriors footprints and encampment. He also joins the unit from time to time for trainings and studies, and helps Red fighters move to neighboring villages. He became more active after being given medical attention by comrades.

NPA-Southern Tagalog launches 2 military trainings

TWO UNITS OF Red fighters of the New People's Army (NPA) completed consecutive military trainings in November in Southern Tagalog guerrilla fronts. The exercises were conducted amid focused military operations by military and police forces in guerrilla fronts across the region.

The training lasted 7-10 days. Primary and secondary NPA officers, fighters, as well as people's militia forces attended.

According to Ka Guillen, political officer of one unit, "Our training was a success despite intense operations of the enemy. We have raised the capacity and determination of the Red fighters to fight and defeat the arrogant enemy."

The training covers the study of basic tactics and techniques in hand-to-hand combat, familiarization with their weapons to actual firing of guns. Secondary and primary command officers were trained.

Led by officers, organized movement was ensured through maneuvers in both offensive and defensive combat scenarios. Increasing the level of strength and resistance of each fighter was also achieved through daily exercises.

The training further strengthened the support and cooperation between each member of the NPA unit. Ka Guillen concluded, "We are sure that our unity will be further strengthened as we coordinately move forward in our struggle."

NTF-Elcac and military defraud BDP's pig and carabao program

NO PIGS NOR carabaos promised by the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) and the National Task Force-Elcac to farmers and indigenous minorities arrived in the barangays of Abra. Not even a piglet, residents said. These commitments are part of the "agricultural support" with funds from the Support to Barangay Development Program (SBDP) of NTF-Elcac.

The residents angrily said the expenses they incurred for building the cages for the promised animals have gone to waste. Instead of carabaos, they were provided with a few plants. Instead of pigs, every resident were given four chicks.

People were made to appear stupid when the AFP gave out feeds for pigs even when no piglets were given. NTF-Elcac also distributed feeds for fish when there are no fishponds in the area, and neither were fingerlings provided.

In Abra province, NTF-Elcac placed 28 barangays under the SBDP project starting in 2021. A staggering ₱236.7 million was allocated for it. Despite this, the barangays did not benefit from the livelihood and development projects that the program supposedly funded.

According to the New People's Army (NPA)-Abra, "The people of the province know that the SBDP has become a milking cow of AFP officials. They have pocketed its billions of funds and has provided no benefit to the barangays."





Rodrigo Duterte's hands are drenched in Lumad people's blood

Spectres of fascist past and crimes against humanity endlessly haunt Rodrigo Duterte. As doors are reopened for International Criminal Court (ICC) to investigate cases against Duterte and his clique, new information has surfaced surrounding a massacre of Lumads in Agusan del Sur.

On March 15, 2020, 88th IB troopers massacred five Higaonons in cold-blood in Sityo Canada, Barangay San Vicente, Esperanza, Agusan del Sur. Among them are two minors. Relatives said Jellyboy Hagayhay (12), Ryan Lumista (16), Emon Hagayhay (18), Man-apyagan Lumista (19), Nieto Pasandigon (21), and Pablo Angkamping (40) where chanced upon and accosted by soldiers in their community. They were on their way to the town center to sell their produce.

The six were bound and tortured the entire day. By nightfall, five were killed by soldiers. Jellyboy was kept alive. Soldiers dumped the victims bodies in a shallow grave and the family without informing their families. A month passed before the family located the grave and the still tied-up bullet-riddled remains.

Jellyboy, witness to the heinous

crime, is kept hostage at the 8th IB

camp in Impasug-ong, Bukidnon. He has been treated like a slave for three years in the military camp. The fascist demons refuse to release the child. They even threaten Jellyboy's family.

When the crime was discovered, the community, along with their datu, confronted the soldiers. To settle and pacify the people, the soldiers forced relatives of the massacre victims to each accept ₱5,000. The barangay captain kept silent, being a paid agent of the National Task Force-Elcac.

Beside the massacre, the PNP Special Action Forces and the Armed Forces of the Philippines (AFP) burned down the school and all the houses in Sitio Canada three days after the massacre. Fifteen houses

in the village were reduced to ashes and almost nothing was left of the Lumad school built by religious groups and the community. The butchers burned books, papers, and other school materials.

Unsatisfied, soldiers and police additionally knocked down fruit trees and cleared an area in the community to make way for a helicopter landing pad. The 88th IB was then led by Lt Col Franklin Fabic (now a colonel of the Unified Command Staff for Intelligence of the AFP WestMinCom).

Since 2019, Ang Bayan has recorded at least 22 cases of human rights violations directly involving the 88th IB. More than 3,500 farmers and Lumads are victims of these cases.

88th IB fires at 3 lumads

SOLDIERS OF THE 88th IB rained bullets on Lumads Levi, Jemboy and an unnamed person in Sitio Takukon, Barangay Indalasa, Malaybalay City, Bukidnon last November 17 in the morning. The three were in the forest to collect durian when soldiers suddenly shot at them.

The victims suffered bruises, wounds and trauma from scurrying and passing though a cliff just to survive. After the incident, the 88th IB boasted of seizing a weapon in its false claim of an encounter with the New People's Army.

The next day, the indigenous leader of the area, Datu Andihal, complained to the barangay and confronted the soldiers of the 88th IB encamped in Barangay Indalasa but was brushed off.



Bonfacio's 160th day commemorated. Bonifacio Day was commemorated by national-democratic forces in Metro Manila, Cebu, Bacolod, Iloilo and Davao on November 30. They called for higher wages, jobs, public services, rights and independence. Young members of Anakbayan, who celebrated their 25th founding anniversary on the same day, joined the march.

March for Palestine. Hundreds of activists and Moros marched in Manila on the afternoon of November 25 to demand a just peace in Palestine and an immediate halt to the genocidal campaign and bombing by Zionist Israel in Gaza. They planned to pass by the US embassy but were blocked by the police. They marched from Luneta to the Cultural Center of the Philippines on Roxas Boulevard where they continued their program.

Residents stop dredging operations in Misamis Oriental

Residents of a barangay in Jasaan, Misamis Oriental won an initial victory when an order to temporarily halt sand mining operations was issued against a company involved in the Dolomite Beach project in Manila Bay of the previous Duterte regime. A local residents' association in Barangay San Nicolas in the said town stopped the destructive dredging operation of the Premium Megastructure, Inc. (PMI) on September 7.

Residents of Barangay San Nicolas and its neighboring barangays are full of dread. The Mindanao Energy (Minergy) company's hydropower plant has been operating in the upper part of the Kabulig River since 2013. Residents fear that the dam might collapse and submerge their communities. The PMI operation exacerbated this threat.

Apart from endangering the community, the company's quarrying and dredging destroys the environment.

What is PMT?

PMI started as a construction company in Leyte in 2012. Its operations grew after being awarded a public contract to build a highway in Leyte. But the company grew fastest under the Duterte regime where it expanded to reclamation and dredging operations. It is owned by Alfredo Comendador Jr.

In Region 10, sand dredging is its main operation. In addition to causing damage to the region, the company is also embroiled in destructive infrastructure projects elsewhere in the country. Aside from Dolomite Beach, the company is a contractor for the Cebu-Cordoba Link Expressway and Bataan Transshipment Hub (BTH) projects, both among the largest state infrastructure projects. BTH is a port project that will dump 235 hectares of land into Mariveles Bay.

Destructive dredging

In 2021, PMI submitted an application for quarrying in the Kabulig River located in Barangay San Juan

and its neighboring barangays San Isidro and Solana in Jasaan. PMI plans to haul excavated gravel from Barangay Los Banzon, in the same town, and bring it to Manila Bay for reclamation. The residents immediately opposed it.

Residents fear for their lives because four barangay sub-villages could be swept away by flood. Residents near the coast of Barangay Bubuntugan and Lower Jasaan will also be affected.

Members of the association gathered signatures in their respective barangays to petition PMI operations to stop. They brought it before the Jasaan municipal hall. They also swiftly submitted a petition to the municipal and provincial Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) offices.

On March 13, 2022, PMI operations resumed. San Nicolas former barangay captain, Warren Manggo, allowed the company to lease the 15-hectare land of resident Sabas Tagarda. He justified this by saying

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Police arrests 7 anti-demolition activists

State forces violently arrested seven anti-demolition activists and residents of Sitio Casia, Barangay Bangkal, Lapu-Lapu City, Cebu while they were protesting against the illegal demolition of 39 houses last November 28-29. The police arrested four residents, Marjhun Amoroto, Belt Sasar, Lito Padillon and Cris Gabutan as well as Anakbayan-Cebu leader Kei Galon, Deviemar Opo of Anakbayan-Lapu-Lapu, and Howell Villacrucis of AMA-Sugbo-KMU. They were released after two days.

According to the groups, the demolition was illegal because no court document was presented by the police. The two groups disclosed that authorities themselves admitted that they carried out a "secret demolition" because they had no legal basis.

The struggle of the people in Sitio Casia for their housing rights began even in 2006. The land is claimed by the Mangura family.

Extrajudicial killing. A platoon of the 62nd IB summarilly killed farmer Bunny Tubalado in a brazen shooting in Sitio Karanawan, Barangay Amuntay, Binalbagan, Negros Occidental on December 6. Soldiers stormed his house around 5 a.m. and shot him in a falsely claimed "encounter."

Abduction. State forces abducted Mar Silos, an organizer of

fishermen and farmers, in Barangay Montecillo, Sariaya, Quezon on November 29. He is a member of the Pagkakaisa ng mga Magsasaka at Tagapagtaguyod sa Ikalawang Distrito-Quezon. He is known as an ardent defender of the rights of fishermen and farmers in Central Quezon.

Shooting. The 50th IB indiscriminately opened fire in Barangay Mataragan, Malibcong, Abra on November 20. The 50th IB claimed an "encounter" occurred in that area which was immediately denied by the New People's Army-Abra. The alleged seizure of an M14, 3 M16, 1 K3 Light Machinegun, and two bandoliers by the 50th IB is also fabricated.

Genocide, made in America

rom November 24 to 30, Israel temporarily stopped bombing Gaza to carry out a "prisoner swap" in which Hamas released 105 of the 345 it captured in the Al Aqsa Flood operation in exchange for 240 of the nearly 10,000 Palestinians imprisoned in Israel. Among those released by Hamas were two Filipino migrant workers.

After a 6-day "humanitarian pause," at 7 a.m. Palestinian time of December 1, Israel again sent warplanes over Gaza. Within 24-hours, 184 Palestinians were killed, 589 were injured and 20 houses were destroyed in the bombardment. Before this, more than 15,000 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli bombing. More than 5,300 of them are children.

All the aircraft Israel uses are from the US and all the bombs these drop are American bombs. In total, 80% of Israel's weapons are USmade.

Funding Zionism

The US imperialist created and maintains the evil Zionist state of Israel. Since World War II, Israel has received \$146 billion, the largest aid the US has ever granted to its allies and colonies. It was almost entirely in the form of military aid, except for a few years when US provided economic aid to "industrialize" the country.

This huge fund is key to developing the Zionist fascist machinery. Before launching the Al Aqsa Flood, in which Palestinian forces invaded various camps and locations in Israel, it was touted as "the most technologically sophisticated military in the world." This aid was also used to establish and develop the Israeli arms industry in partnerships with monopoly American arms makers. Some of the largest companies are Elbit Systems, Israel Aerospace Industries and Rafael.

With its current genocide in Gaza, the US Congress has adopted an urgent proposal to add \$14.3 billion to the previous \$3.3 billion annual military aid to Israel. This aid comes in the form of Hellfire missiles, 55mm cannon artillery, night-vision, bunker-buster (anti-tunnel) munitions and new military vehicles. These are in addition to the Iron Dome missiles and aerial bombs the US already supplies. US also supplies Israel with chemical and biological war matériel.

It is estimated that Israel has poured \$48 billion into the two-month genocidal campaign. One third of this amount was shouldered by the US.

that "no resident objected to the entry of PMI." Because of this, the residents filed a case of "falsification of public documents" before the Ombudsman against Manggo.

Worse, PMI's permit stipulates they would be doing dredging in San Nicolas, but the company actually did black sand mining.

Because of this, the residents' resistance grew stronger. They expanded their signature campaign to other barangays that will be affected by the project, and

protested in front of the ongoing PMI operation. The residents' demands include PMI's violation of the prescribed amount of gravel to be taken.

The residents of San Nicolas know their fight is not over. The temporary restraining order (TRO) imposed on the company will expire this December. Also, its quarrying continues in the nearby barrios of San Isidro and Solana. They vow to continue to stand up for their land and the environment.



and fascist machinery exist to maintain US hegemony in the Middle East. Since the 1980s, the US has maintained here the largest weapons stockpile outside its own country, to ensure that weapons can be quickly deployed in the event of any "regional conflict." Hidden inside the country is the so-called War Reserve Stockpile Allies-Israel or WRSA-I controlled by the US. Annually, the US allocates \$200 million to fill the armory. Similar storage exists in South Korea and Japan, and same facilities are now being set up by the US in the Philippines.

In October, US president Joseph Biden pushed to remove restrictions on Israel's use of weapons from this stockpile so that it could freely use US weapons in the genocide in Gaza.

The US awarded Israel the status of a "major non-NATO ally" and tightly aligned its fascist army with the American armed forces. Since 1983, the US and Israel have jointly developed the Israel Defense Forces, which is essentially an offensive force for the bloody occupation campaign of the Palestinian territories.

The US also maintains its own forces inside Israel, in addition to the hundreds of thousands stationed in various countries in the Middle East. In 2017, the US publicized the construction of a permanent American base inside an Israeli military camp in the Negev desert, 20 kilometers from Gaza. Two months before the Al Aqsa Flood, the US poured \$35.8 million into expanding this secret base, codenamed "Site 512" and dubbed "a base within a base."
